
Introduction



The proposed development site is shown on the plan to the left.

The existing camp and caravan park covers an area of around 2.75 hectares and will be referred to as the 'Northern Area' (solid line).

The proposed extension area measures around 0.92 hectares and is referred to as the 'Southern Area' (dashed line).

The site lies to the west of the Am Beanaidh burn and is accessed via the B970 road.

There has been a camp and caravan site at this location since the 1950s.

The most recent Caravan Site Licence issued by The Highland Council (Ref. B&S /Rothiemurchus/Tour) is dated February 2016 and guides the overall management of the site. The maximum site capacity is: 17 touring caravan pitches (plus one for the assistant warden); 50 holiday caravan pitches (plus one for the warden); and 22 tents. This is consistent with the 1982 planning permission for the site.

The current proposals seek to extend the site into the land to the South to enable the full permitted site capacity to be utilised. It will also ensure that the camp and caravan site is able to continue to safeguard the Natura 2000 area by meeting evolving customer requirements including accommodating today's larger caravans and motor homes. To confirm, the overall number of approved caravan and tent pitches will not increase as a consequence of the proposals.

Specifically, the 17 existing touring caravan pitches will be relocated from the Northern part of the site into the Southern area. This will enable the layout of the Northern area (including the 50 existing holiday caravan pitches) to be improved.

The preliminary site layouts presented at this exhibition are informed by ecological surveys undertaken in 2016. These surveys will be updated over the course of the next few months and the results will be used to update the proposals as necessary.








Site Context

Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan 2015

The map to the right is taken from the adopted Local Development Plan and shows that the entire site is allocated for tourism uses (blue shaded area).

The Plan states that the existing caravan and camping site supports the provision of tourism accommodation within Inverdruie and Coylumbridge.

Subject to further ecological assessment, enhancement opportunities will be supported where appropriate.



Statutory Designations

The site lies within the Cairngorms National Park boundary and the Cairngorms National Scenic Area.


Most of the site is designated as Ancient Woodland. The existing camp and caravan park is covered by a Tree Preservation Order and is included in the Rothiemurchus Long-Term Forest Plan 2016-2035.

Two Core Paths run along the northern and western boundaries of the site. The latter is known as the Lairig Ghru Core Path. In addition to walking and cycling opportunities, this Estate track provides vehicle access to residential properties to the south and occasional timber haulage.

A number of other designations surround the site boundary:

- Cairngorm Special Area of Conservation
- River Spey Special Area of Conservation
- Cairngorm Special Protection Area
- North Rothiemurchus Pinewood Site of Special Scientific Interest

Northern Area Proposals










General Views of Existing Camp and Caravan Park
